(59 respondents, some flagged more than one thing, reported in their words, but separated under different headings, for ease of reading)

Australian focus: General

- 1. Settlement. Australian based
- 2. Photocopiable resources that are related to ACSF levels in an Australian context.
- 3. Australian resources on everyday topics for Levels Pre, 1 & 2
- 4. Relevant, Australian, high interest but low enough level to be achievable.
- 5. Resources relevant to adult migrant/refugee learners in Australia at any level, or even better multilevel or easily adaptable.
- 6. Current relevant and engaging resources for adult migrants about living in Australia

Australian focus: Speaking and Listening

- 1. Australian, curriculum related, corpus informed, authentic conversations and transactions for listening
- 2. Australian listening/viewing at Low levels. Lots and lots of mini interactions. eg Kim buys a blue pen. Kim asks "Where is the bus stop?"
- 3. Australian speaking, reading activities
- 4. Up to date, relevant Australian materials for transactions, instructions and spoken information

Australian focus: Reading and literacy/phonics

- 1. Low level (CSWE 1) Adult Australian content readers, workplace related stuff
- 2. Low literacy phonics development with settlement focus
- 3. Stories based on Settlement Issues

More Speaking and Listening

- 1. Listening resources elementary to intermediate
- 2. Speaking and listening

- 4. Listening materials, materials focusing on "functional" situations

- 7. Those for students working towards exit ACSF 1, aligned to the CSL curriculum & about work

For younger learners

- 1. Readers for high school students of EAL/D background of high interest but low/very low literacy
- 2. EAL/D online resources for Emerging, Developing and Consolidating Secondary students
- 3. Classroom resources/teaching units aligned to Victorian English curriculum
- 4. Senior secondary designed for EAL this is unfortunately State-specific
- 5. Children's

Higher levels

- 1. Ones that build vocabulary and semantics
- 2. Communicative IELTS
- 3. Upper Intermediate writing and reading
- 4. Academic English speaking currently but some lower levels for General English
